Trove Under Threat of Closing Down

Trove is a massive digital archive of newspapers, books, maps and other records created by the National Library of Australia and its partner organisations. It is supported by thousands of volunteers who edit the electronically translated text to correct the errors made by the optical character recognition software used in scanning the newspapers.

Trove is used by family historians and other researchers with over 22 million visits a year (60,000 a day). Family historians will use it for its newspaper collection which includes hundreds of titles dating back to the 1800s. Without Trove access to these records would be difficult if not impossible.

Do you use TROVE?

If you do then you need to be concerned with the recent announcement that government funding will not cover the current and future costs of keeping this important website. See the announcement from National Library of Australia (NLA) here:

This outlines clearly that there is sufficient funding up to June 2023, but after this the funding is uncertain.

What can you do about it?

If you are a taxpayer you can write to Prime Minister, the Treasurer, the Minister for the Arts, and your local member to express your concern. If one of these is in your local area consider making an appointment and go and see them, as a personal approach will have a greater impact.

If you are an Office Holder of your organisation please encourage your members to also write their concerns. When writing it is much better for this to be in your own words. Tell them how you use the website and why it is important for it continue and to expand in the future.

Correspondence which is well argued, concise and respectful is usually well received and may tip the balance for the reader.

AFFHO will make a formal submission to the Government and the Prime Minister in due course.



Her formal qualifications include a Bachelor of Arts (with Majors in History and Jewish Studies) and a Master of Education and she has over 20 years of experience at a Secondary College as a librarian and teacher of History, Geography, English and Literature. Rebecca's depth of experience in engaging and enthusing students through remote learning during the Covid pandemic will bring new approaches, and be a great aid, to online education and discussion circle activities. Rebecca also has a depth of experience with preparing and using websites, blogs and vlogs, wikis, apps, social media and knowledge management, all of which will help GSV creatively promote resources and facilitate their use by GSV members and the family history community.

Rebecca has been actively engaged in family history research for 15 years and clearly remembers the thrill of her first big discovery bent over a microfiche machine in the GSV's basement library in Collins St. She finds genealogical research an enchanting puzzle, while exploring family, history and place through an array of information sources. Her curiosity about her family's history has taken her to numerous places around Victoria and to the UK. Rebecca has enjoyed working with students to help them learn how to critically examine sources to make informed decisions about their ancestors and she now looks forward to helping our members discover their own world of family history.



Mary McKee presentation at SAG

On Friday 24 February, The Society of Australian Genealogists was pleased to have Mary McKee, Head of Content Publishing Operations at Findmypast, presented a special webinar on **tracing LGBT ancestors** alongside the WorldPride festival running in Sydney 17 February to 5 March 2023.

Mary took us through a series of record types and explore the ways we can uncover our LGBT ancestors from history. She explored historical terminology and laws which were a fascinating look into the challenges of the past.

The talk was very well received by those present and also captured discussion about some of the failings of our online platforms to be able to record the diversity of our family members - Mary was able to outline how Findmypast have been addressing these issues from the presentation of spouses to how avatars are displayed. In her day job with Findmypast Mary oversees teams that digitise and publish millions of historic records and newspapers every year and has been key to the recent 1921 Census of England and Wales release.

The Hidden Web: Digging Deeper

When Google and traditional search engines don't return useful information, don't stop there. We will explore resources that are invisible to Google and hidden deep within web sites and proprietary databases. The "hidden web" lies buried within the collections for commercial web sites, libraries, archives, and museums.

We will also talk about the importance of indexes that deep-link into web sites online, thus uncovering hidden gems of information that may not be found easily through a search engine query.

This exciting short story writing competition is back for 2023, with cash prizes - 1st prize of \$1,000 sponsored by Family History ACT, 2nd prize \$500 sponsored by the University of Tasmania and a special Family History ACT member only prize of a \$100 society voucher. The competition will be judged to select the best short story of 1,500 – 2,000 words on a family history / genealogy theme.

We also welcome **three new judges** to the 2023 competition – Heather Garnsey, Bernadette Thakur and Jenny Higgins.

Heather is best known for her 35 years working with the Society of Australian Genealogists (SAG). She retired from this very full-time position in February 2020 hoping to finally spend more time on her own family history. Heather is an Honorary Fellow of FHACTION.

Bernadette was awarded the T.T. Reed Family History Book Award in 2021 for her book *Irish Settlers in South Australia: the Hayes and O'Toole Families*. This Award is made annually by the South Australian Genealogy & Heraldry Society to the person producing the best family history in a given calendar year.

Jenny is a long term FHACTION member and has been researching family history for over forty years, working as a private researcher and a family history librarian at the National Library of Australia. She is currently employed as a family history researcher at the Australian Dictionary of Biography at the Australian National University.
