National Family History Month at Caloundra Family History Research Inc.

In celebration of National Family History Month, Caloundra Family History recently held a one-day seminar on how to Research Your Convict Ancestor. The event was open to the general public and we had a fabulous turn out. We welcomed three local guest speakers: Helen V. Smith, Shauna Hicks, and Trisha Hyde; and broadened the seminar with presenter Vicki Osborn from the Maitland & Beyond Family History Inc of NSW. Convict Connections and the Fellowship of First Fleeters - Moreton Chapter were represented as seminar exhibitors

The presenters and exhibitors helped us to better understand what our convict ancestors experienced from their arrest, imprisonment, transportation and their new lives in Australia.

We learnt how to better research the amazing amount of information available in Australian and UK records and were reminded to think laterally and take a look at whether our ancestors were on the other side of the law as police offices, witnesses to crime or members of the jury. A short film produced by the Maitland family history group showed a unique way of telling the stories and experiences of several of their own female convict ancestors and of their Convict Bonnet Project as a touching way to commemorate the founding mothers of the Hunter Valley region.

Al for family history is an interesting concept for family historians, however, we have found our members are in need of assistance with basic computer literacy as well as enhanced research techniques. To that end, CFHRI now has a dedicated Training Officer who runs courses throughout the year for both members and non-members to learn new research skills. Our next course will be open to non-members and held on October 27 and 28, 2023 "Beginners Family History Research Course for Seniors". This is a repeat of our highly successful course that was run in 2022 as part of Seniors Month. The training sessions break down the daunting task of where to begin and how to manage your information. We explore where to find the information you need looking at both digital and hard copy records and how to successfully navigate them.

CFHRI training continues with our War Histories of Our Soldiers Project. Our Training Officer guides members through the complex maze of information available on Australians who have fought for their country to enable members to complete a comprehensive war story on their ancestor. We aim to publish these stories in the future.

During the remainder of this year, CFHRI will be supporting the 2023 IAgeWell Festival on Tuesday 10 October, 2023. This is a great event to showcase – not only to the general public, but to other exhibitors - what our group of family history enthusiasts is all about. We will also be supporting our local council on October 21 and 22 by conducting our popular historic walking tours of Bulcock Street and Bulcock Beach as part of the Sunshine Coast Open House Festival 2023.

We have three general meetings yet to run before dusting off the tinsel for Christmas and we have an excellent line up of guest speakers. Held the third Thursday of each month, we are welcoming Moya Sharp, OAM to talk about the Goldfields of Western Australia, Pauline Cass will be talking about copyright, privacy and ethics; and John Blow (and yes that is his real name) will present on a Sandakan death march survivor.

In May 2023 Caloundra Family History Research Inc celebrated its 30th Birthday! We had a glorious sunny day for the event which was held under marquees at our headquarters at the Sunshine Coast Turf Club. President, June Blackburn, welcomed our long-standing patrons, Mark and Judy McArdle, representatives from other local history societies, Committee Members and members past and present including a few founding members. CFHRI launched an anniversary book detailing our groups' 30-year history. Founding members shared the trials of researching in pre-internet days when all they had to rely on were print books, microfiche and BDM certificates and how CFHRI grew from this group of friends researching at the local Caloundra library to the group it is today with 115 members.

Our 2023 judging panel Heather Garnsey, Jenny Higgins and Bernadette Thakur now have the task of reading and assessing the entries and the difficult decision to select a short list.

50th Anniversary South Australian Genealogy & Heraldry Society

The South Australian Genealogy & Heraldry Society celebrated its 50th anniversary with a dinner on Saturday 19th August with 80 members and staff or family of members in attendance. Members from throughout the Society's lifetime attended and it was noted that 13 of the 93 members of the Society who had kept their membership continuously since joining in the first decade of the Society were present.

A special presentation was made to Andrew Peake to commemorate his involvement with the Society over more than 50 years. Andrew was a co-founder of the Society and in December 1971 wrote to the then Bishop of Adelaide, the late Dr

T T Reed, who was interested in heraldry, about starting a genealogy society in South Australia. That led to the formation of the Society in 1973 and Andrew has been involved continuously ever since in many ways on Committees and as a volunteer. He has served on the Society Council for about thirty eight years including holding the offices of President, Vice President and Secretary. He is a current Vice President. He has also written several books on family history sources in South Australia. Andrew has received numerous awards for his contribution to genealogy the Fellow and Life Member awards from the Society and the AFFHO Award for Meritorious Service to Family History, the Premier's Certificate for Recognition of Outstanding Volunteer Service and an OAM for service to family history.

As with all the Society's previous anniversary celebrations there was a cake. The cutting of the cake was performed by two members, the member with the longest continuous membership in the Society, Andrew Peake and the most recent new member present, which was Airlie Black. By coincidence Airlie is a daughter of the Society's late patron Dr T T Reed, also a co-founder of the Society.

Society member, editor of the Society journal and social historian, Dr Heidi Ing was the guest speaker at the dinner. Heidi's talk had the title "Collaboration, Contribution, Community" and was largely based upon her experiences with the Society and her perception of its achievements. The ability of the Society to purchase its own premises as a result of the work of the volunteers was noted. The enormous contribution of the Society's volunteers was recognised with the online databases which have supported the Society's success in recent years having a special mention. Some challenges were made for the Society to further develop the capabilities of the online databases and for hybrid meetings for the Special Interest Groups.
