From the By-laws:

AFFHO AWARD FOR MERITORIOUS SERVICE TO FAMILY HISTORY

9.1 An award may be made at each triennial Australasian Congress on Genealogy and Heraldry for meritorious service to family history in Australasia, at the discretion of the Council of the Federation.

9.2 Nominations for the Award may be made by any Full Member or Associate Member organisation of the Federation and shall include a clear indication of the service given, with special emphasis being placed on voluntary contribution.

9.3 Nominations shall be submitted in writing, in 500 words or less and shall be received by the Secretary of the Federation three (3) months prior to each Congress.

- 9.4 The Council of the Federation shall act as the judging panel.
- 9.5 Presentation of the Award by the President of AFFHO will take place at the Congress.

The Genealogical Society of Victoria Writing Prize, 2020

This year is the eighth year that the Genealogical Society of Victoria (GSV) has conducted its Writing Prize, which is open to members of the GSV and its member societies. The entries were judged by a panel consisting of three members of the *Ancestor* Editorial Team, a President's nominee, Joy Roy FGSV, and a guest judge, well-known historian and author, Dr Gary Presland, FRHSV. The GSV is very appreciative of the ongoing support of Ancestry, which has sponsored the prize since its inception.

In awarding the prizes, President Jenny Redman stressed the importance of writing up your family stories as well as researching them. She thanked all the judges for their work in reading and assessing the entries, and thanked Leonie Ellis for her work in co-ordinating the competition.

From a strong field of contestants, the winner was Brian Reid, with his story 'Tom were the naughty lad', which is published in the December issue of *Ancestor*, the GSV's quarterly magazine. This piece takes us back to rural Cumbria in the nineteenth century, and tells us of his great grandfather Tom's 'naughty' exploits, against a background of ancient customs and class prejudice. Brian wins a year's subscription to Ancestry's worldwide membership and a DNA test. In accepting the

prize, Brian spoke of how daunting it had been, but also helpful, to have his work discussed in the GSV Writers Circle, and told us how surprised his high school English teachers would be to see him win a writing prize.

Susan Wight was the runner-up with her story 'Webster Soda Water', which will be published in the March issue of *Ancestor*. It tells of the ups and downs of her ancestors as they established a soda water business, initially on the goldfields and later in other parts of Victoria and New South Wales. Susan wins a six-month subscription to Ancestry's worldwide membership. Susan expressed appreciation of the opportunity and encouragement the prize affords to people to write up their family history.



About Norfolk Island

Norfolk Island's story is really quite incredible with Polynesian migration 'book-ending' four distinct settlements of people. As the most westerly point of Polynesian migration, human habitation began 750 years ago with Polynesian contact.

Following two British penal settlements (1788-1814 and 1825-1855), the descendants of the Polynesian women and Mutiny on the Bounty men arrived in 1856 from Pitcairn Island, and their rich cultural legacy shapes the Island today.

The Island's history, heritage and culture are equally matched with a stunning pristine environment and unique bio-diversity. These can be seen within the rainforests in the National Parks; an unspoilt marine reserve of reef that fringes the World Heritage Site in Kingston; and at the Island's beaches.

Travel packages have been arranged in conjunction with Norfolk Island Travel Centre.


Travel dates from Sydney are **30 July to 6 August 2021**, and from Brisbane **31 July to 7 August 2021**.

Judges Kerrie Gray, Barbara Moore and Professor Peter Stanley paid tribute to the entrants, saying the quality of the writing and storytelling was high. Speaking at the event, Kerrie said 'Excellent stories are very hard to separate, but I think the four things that really lifted the shortlisted entries were a strong beginning that immediately captured interest, questions left unanswered, the way the characters were brought to life and inspiring or challenging me to take my own research further'.

Fifty four entries were received across a vast range of topics and styles. Thank you to all the entrants from across Australia – we appreciate your support of this competition. Selecting the winner was clearly a difficult decision.

Congratulations to the winner, David Wintrip, for his story A Lamb's Tale. In commending the winning entry, the judges commented that *'writing of this quality in a creative (and even risky) form deserves recognition'*. Following the presentations, the audience enjoyed a reading of David's emotionally moving historical story about a shepherd who took his own life – read by Kerrie Gray.


