Larissa Behrendt is the Distinguished Professor at the University of Technology Sydney and at the Director of Research and Academic Programs Jumbunna Institute of Indigenous Education and Research. She is the host of Speaking Out on ABC Radio

She has published numerous textbooks on Indigenous legal issues. She is a member of the Academy of Arts and Sciences and a founding member of the Australian Academy of Law. Her most recent novel is After Story.

Larissa won the 2002 David Uniapon Award and a 2005 Commonwealth Writer's Prize for her novel Home. Her second novel, Legacy, won a Victorian Premiers Literary Award.

Larissa is an award-winning filmmaker, having written and directed several feature documentary films including Araatika! Rise Up, Maralinga Tjarutka, After the Apology and Innocence Betrayed. She has written and directed for television. She won the AACTA for Best Direction in Television Factual in 2020 for Maralinga Tjarutja and the 2018 Australian Directors Guild Award for Best Direction in a Feature Documentary for After the Apology. Catherine Warr has become one of the most prominent young local historians, reaching thousands of people all over the world through her YouTube channel Yorkshire's Hidden History. With a passion for making history interesting, engaging, and accessible for all, she has been featured in a national YouTube campaign recognising regional creators. Her first book - A Yorkshire Year: 366 Days of Folklore, Customs, and Traditions - is due to be released in Summer 2022.

Daniel Horowitz is Genealogy Expert at *MyHeritage*, providing key contributions liaising with genealogy societies, bloggers and media, as well as lecturing, and attending conferences around the world. Dedicated to Genealogy since 1986, he was the teacher and the study guide editor of the family history project "Searching for My Roots" in Venezuela for 15 years. Daniel is involved in several crowdsource digitization and transcription projects and holds a board level position at the Israel Genealogy Research Association (IGRA).

WW1 "Call to Arms" Recruiting Forms

In 1915 the Commonwealth Government began a vigorous recruitment campaign to raise more troops for the Expeditionary Forces.

As part of this campaign in December 1915 the War Census Bureau sent out a form to every male of military age in Australia asking them about their willingness to enlist.

The form was titled 'The Defence of Australia and the Empire'.

The Call to Arms' and recorded name, address, marital status, age, number of dependants, condition of health and occupation.

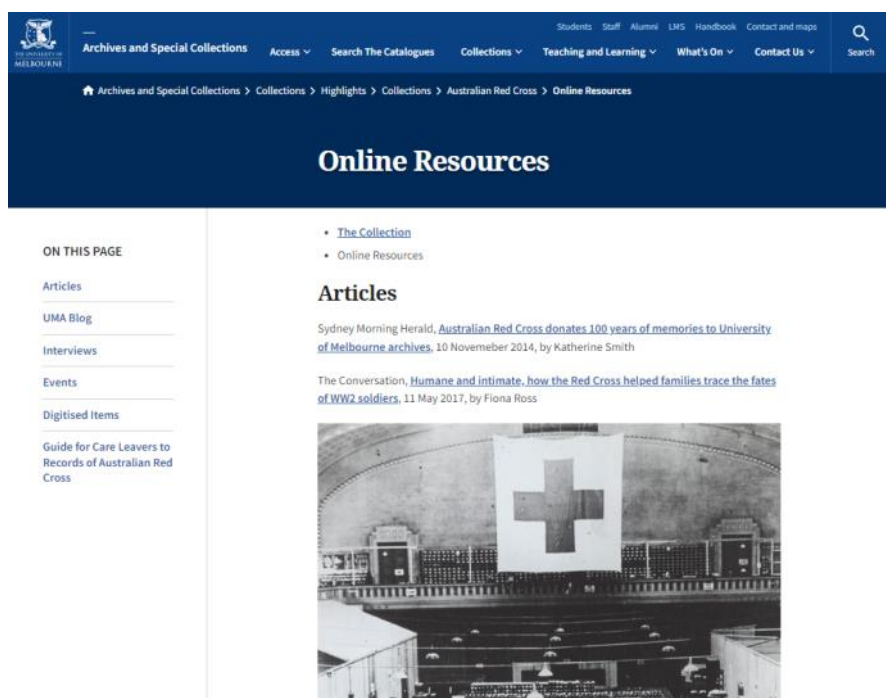

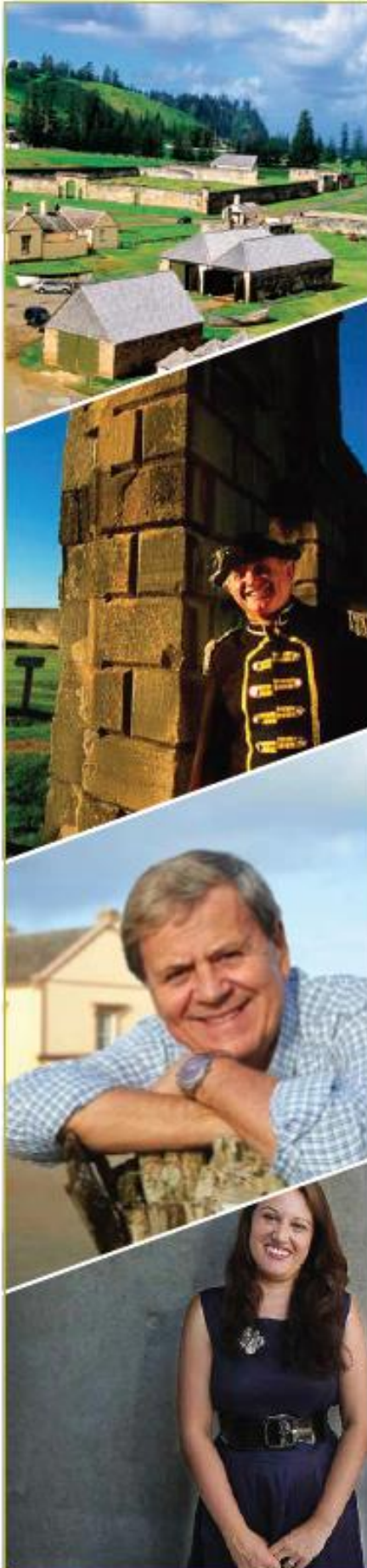

A range of interesting speakers, covering topics such as stories from Norfolk Island's Second British Settlement, Female Immigration to Australia in the 1830s, and the use of DNA in genealogical research have been organised for concurrent sessions.

About Norfolk Island

Norfolk Island's story is really quite incredible with Polynesian migration 'book-ending' four distinct settlements of people. As the most westerly point of Polynesian migration, human habitation began 750 years ago with Polynesian contact.

Following two British penal settlements (1788-1814 and 1825-1855), the descendants of the Polynesian women and Mutiny on the Bounty men arrived in 1856 from Pitcairn Island, and their rich cultural legacy shapes the Island today.

The Island's history, heritage and culture are equally matched with a stunning pristine environment and unique bio-diversity. These can be seen within the rainforests in the National Parks; an unspoilt marine reserve of reef that fringes the World Heritage Site in Kingston; and at the Island's beaches.



Chris Paton will look at the resources that can place our families in context, including, for example, freeholders lists and absent voters lists, the administration of the poor law and the role of the poorhouse in Ireland, and education records.

He will also look at surviving judicial records and the records of law enforcement, and explore a case study of a 19th century murder which unblocked a genealogical brick wall and pushed a family narrative back a hundred years to the mid 18th century.
